4	Study in an environment free from distractions.		
6	Use a proven method for self-testing to discover what you have and have not learned before you take a test.		
•	Utilize campus tutors, Supplemental Instruction sessions, study groups, and college level learning skills handouts to improve your study skills and increase your learning.		
7	Schedule regular study times when your mind is most receptive to learning.		
8	Use active study strategies.		
•	Complete assigned readings or problems prior to class.
